Shopping from home

From Thursday 5 November, Waitrose will be extending their Click & Collect service to their Hawkhurst store.

You'll be able to go online to <u>waitrose.com</u>, order your groceries and choose Click & Collect instead of home delivery. Then, you'll be able to collect your order from the enquiry desk in the store. Minimum order is £40.

This will provide a useful option for online shoppers who can't secure one of the precious delivery slots and for those who prefer to leave the trolley trudge to someone else!

The branch will start with 15 orders per day, with hourly slots for collection between 10am and 7pm Monday to Saturday and 10am to 3pm Sunday.

Coronavirus cases in Tunbridge Wells

Since the start of the pandemic, the Borough has recorded 811 cases and 53 deaths*.

During the 7 day period to 17 October, 63 cases were recorded in the Borough. Hawkhurst, Benenden and Sandhurst recorded eight cases; Cranbrook, Sissinghurst and Frittenden recorded six. Rates per 100 thousand population were, in both areas, slightly above the average for England as a whole.

*Deaths occurring from any cause within 28 days of a positive test for COVID-19.

Our local COVID alert level is MEDIUM What does this mean?

- you must not socialise in groups larger than 6, indoors or outdoors (other than where a legal exemption applies)
- businesses and venues can continue to operate, in a COVID-secure manner, other than those that remain closed in law
- certain businesses are required to ensure customers only consume food and drink while seated,
 and must close between 10pm and 5am
- businesses and venues selling food for consumption off the premises via a delivery service, click & collect or drive-through can continue to do so after 10pm
- schools and universities remain open
- places of worship remain open, subject to the rule of 6**
- weddings and funerals can go ahead with restrictions on numbers of attendees
- exercise classes and organised sport can continue to take place outdoors, or indoors if the rule of 6 is followed. There are exceptions for supervised activities for under-18s, and disability sport

You must:

wear a face covering in those areas where this is mandated

You should continue to:

- follow social distancing rules
- work from home where you can effectively do so
- when travelling, plan ahead or avoid busy times and routes; walk or cycle if you can

** Any gathering of more than six people in England is illegal, unless it meets one of the exemptions. This applies to gatherings both indoors and outdoors. The rule does not apply to households or bubbles of more than six, or gatherings for work or education.
