We are delighted to have appointed a replacement Volunteer Manager to take over from Astrid - the wonderful Ruth Saunders - whom many of you will know already.

Ruth says "I have been involved with HCSG since the early days, initially as coordinator for the central phone line and more recently in setting up the Food4Families project. A resident of Hawkhurst for twenty years, but a commuter for many of them, I am now retired from the City and embracing village and community life. I am actively involved in the running of the RVS Hawkhurst Friendship Club and Cranbrook Film Society and I volunteer at Sissinghurst Castle Garden; all of which I am missing right now. Hawkhurst Community Fridge

Have you noticed the large fridge and larder section outside the Green Shop? The Hawkhurst Community Fridge is part of Hubbub's UK-wide Community Fridge Network, redistributing food that would otherwise go to waste. According to Hubbub, the average UK family wastes £810 a year by throwing away food



and drink which could have been eaten, and £3 billion is wasted by food sectors. So far, Community Fridges have helped thousands connect to their communities, access nutritious food, save money and reduce waste.

Our fridge is supported by **Hawkhurst Community Trust** and run entirely by volunteers. Anyone is welcome to come and take what they wish from the fridge and shelves - it's not a food bank but a *community project* for all to share and reduce waste. There is also a box called 'Hens of Hawkhurst' containing bread that has gone over for chickens, ducks or pigs!

Open 9.30am - 4pm Monday to Saturday.

Food is donated by individuals and local retailers such as Eggs to Apples, Tesco and Sandhurst Farm Shop. If you have any surplus food that's still good to eat, you can donate it via the donation box inside the Green Shop.





A message from the Campaign to Protect Hawkhurst Village - *objections to be lodged no later than Monday 27th July*:

URGENT CALL FOR ACTION

Don't let developers build on Hawkhurst Golf Course!

A revised application has been submitted by Cedardrive to build 340 new houses on the 49 acres of green space that is currently Hawkhurst Golf Club, in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). This is totally unsuitable for the following reasons:

- significant and irreparable harm to the AONB
- unsustainable location Hawkhurst does NOT have the infrastructure to support this increase in population. Residents will be dependent on their cars, on already severely congested roads and against all climate change concerns
- highways safety KCC and the developer's own safety audit have identified significant safety concerns with the proposed roundabout and layout in a location already suffering from acknowledged speeding issues
- impact on Hawkhurst crossroads the developer's own figures predict a 100% increase in traffic on the High Street, over 8,000 car movements per day and a daily average queue length of 125 cars (600m) on the High Street side of the crossroads
- impact on Flimwell junction even greater delays are predicted
- impact on the village's smaller roads Slip Mill Road, Delmonden Lane and North Hill Road will become rat runs as motorists seek to avoid the crossroads
- **increased pollution levels** the village's air quality is currently running *above the danger level* of 40 micrograms per cubic metre; it is already almost double that figure
- increased noise levels inevitable from 8,000 additional car movements per day
- **impact on sewage system** this is overloaded and cannot cope with current volumes, already representing a danger to health
- ecology even the revised application will cause the loss of a huge number of trees and impact upon numerous important habitats. The alleged bio-diversity net gain is unsubstantiated.


Meet the HCSG Team
